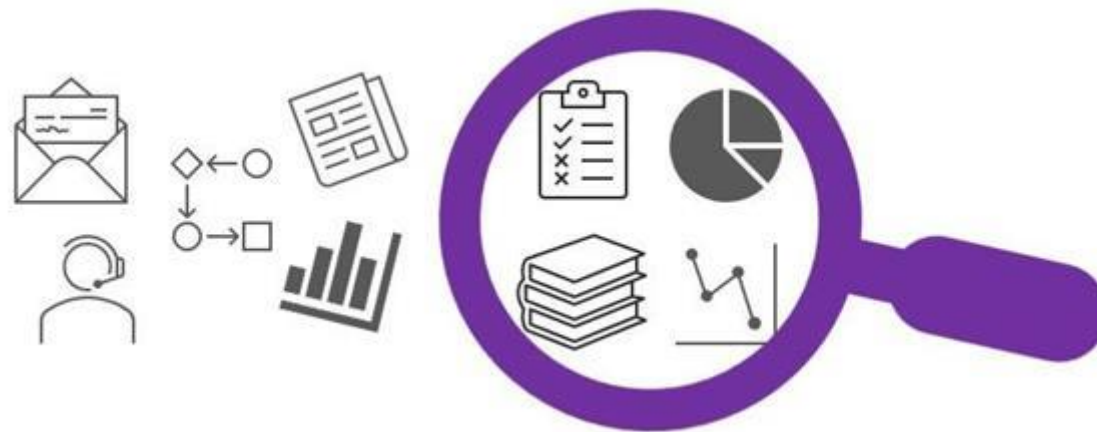

Key findings

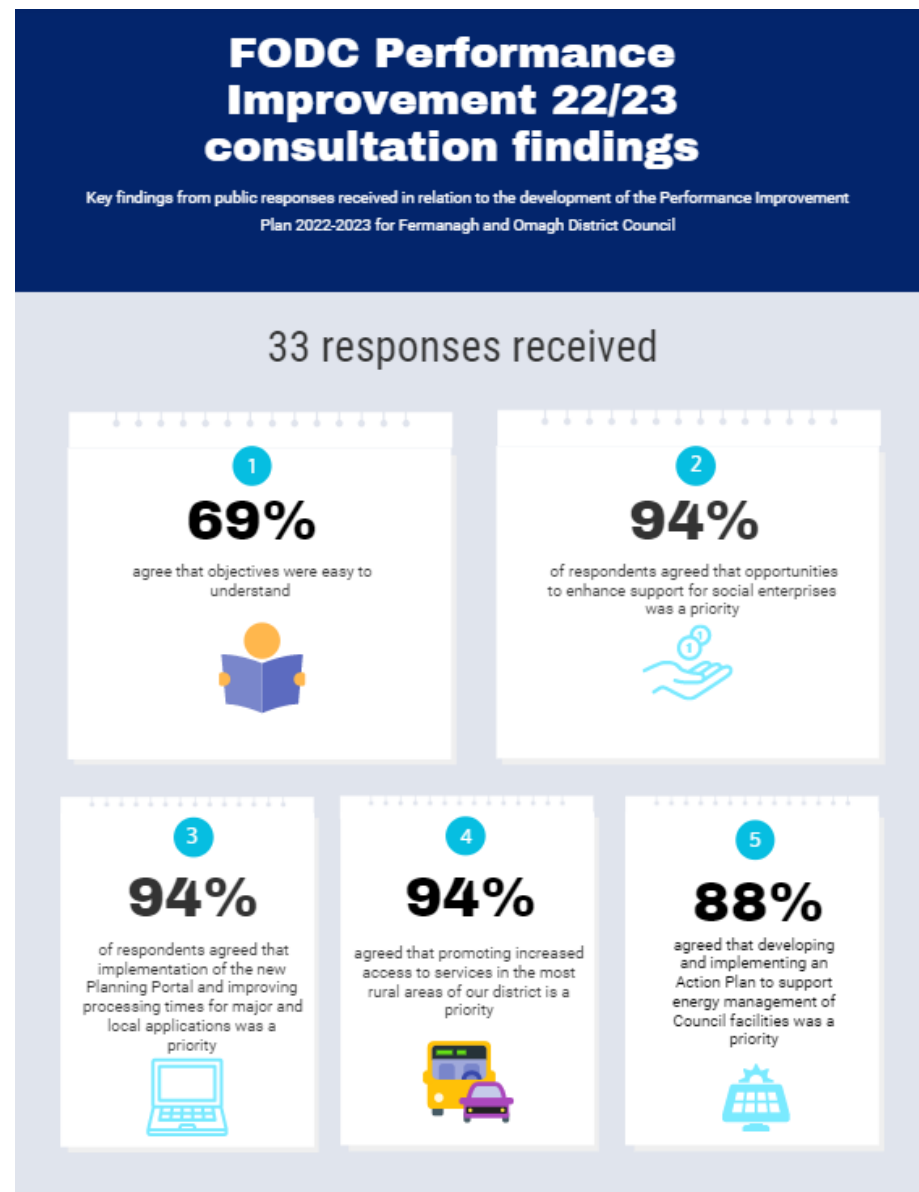
The responses received were largely in agreement with the improvement objectives identified. Key findings include:

- Improving our **Environmental Behaviours** of all residents must be included as a priority;
- Need to raise communities' awareness of **Place Shaping** concept;
- Desire for investment in town centres and in rural communities;
- Desire for improved active travel opportunities.

The final Performance Improvement Plan 2022-23 will be launched on or before 30 June 2022 on the council's web site, social media platforms and in the local press.

1.0 Introduction

The Consultation process to support the identification of improvement objectives for Fermanagh and Omagh District Council's **Performance Improvement Plan 2022- 20233** took a participative and diverse approach.

A range of consultation methods were adopted, key target groups were identified to maximise involvement and a diverse range of engagement methods deployed, maximising technology, and ensuring all Section 75 categories had an opportunity to respond. An overview of the methods used, and evidence to support demonstrating impact is outlined in Table one below.

The public consultation ran for a period of eight weeks commencing on **28 March 2022** until **23 May 2022**. Consultation responses could be submitted in writing (either by email or letter), online survey or by contacting a council official to discuss. This consultation was conducted in line with GDPR and Data Protection legislation.

At the closing date, 33 responses were received from the public consultation survey and 44 from staff. An overall total of 77 responses were received. This is a 57% increase on responses received last year. This feedback directly informed the content of the Performance Improvement Plan 2022 -2023.

3.4 Breakdown of respondents per category

The majority of responses received were from citizens/ratepayers. Despite targeted engagement, no responses were received from local businesses or statutory partners. It is suggested that because of this outcome that a different approach to engaging with businesses and statutory partners be considered next year. The following recommendations have been made:

- 1. Hold a focus group discussion with CPP partners on the development of Performance Improvement Plan 2023-2024.**
- 2. Utilise the Labour Market Partnership as a catalyst to engage with the sector, specifically on the actions identified on business start up activity and mentoring support, as well as tourism.**

Enniskillen workhouse is set to be completed this summer

The Enniskillen Workhouse is set to be complete in August this year and will provide tours, accommodate school visits, and enable people to look up records of people that went through the workhouse.

The building is steeped in history. It was commissioned to be built in 1841 and finished in 1844, a year before the famine broke out in 1845 to help people as there was no National Health Service. During the famine South West Ulster was hardest hit with 20 percent of the Fermanagh population that died. The workhouse became a general hospital but was largely demolished in 1984 to make way for the Erne Hospital.

The National Lottery Heritage Fund awarded South West College and Fermanagh and Omagh District Council £2,343,000, to undertake a major heritage project on the site helping to restore the workhouse as well as offer a heritage and skills education programme through the college.

Robert Fitzpatrick the Heritage Skills co-ordinator for the project said, "There is a number of projects running alongside this such as bursary holders who will gain a level 3 NVQ qualification in heritage skills, we have a level 3 award which is a two day course for construction people that want to know more about repair and maintenance of heritage and then we have workhouse tours, and then we have working with the schools to make them aware of the importance of heritage, protecting these buildings and we have a few public events about saving these buildings and restoration."

"One of the courses offered is specific to pre 1919 buildings so there is many of these buildings in Ireland, especially in Enniskillen, so this is a qualification for people going forward to restore these buildings," he said.

Mr Fitzpatrick explained that when the workhouse is completed the first floor space will be revitalised as a state of the art hub for business innovation and enterprise and will provide mentoring and training to support student entrepreneurship and growing business and people will be able to avail of the resources at South West College.

The ground floor will be an area of reminiscence and records, visitors and educational visits and what life was like in the workhouse.

Boating equipment worth £100k stolen in Belnaleck

FERNAMAGH police have issued an appeal for information following the theft of around £100,000 in boat equipment earlier this month.

The local PSNI issued the appeal at the weekend following the theft from a yard in Belnaleck on Sunday, March 20th, into the early hours of Monday, March 21st.

A total of eight Mercruiser and Volvo Penta outdrives - which are the boat's outboard engines - were taken in the incident. "We are asking for anyone who saw any suspicious activity in the Belnaleck area around the time to contact 101 quoting reference number 518 22/03/22," said

A Fermanagh PSNI spokesman. "Thiefs from boats is sadly nothing new in Fermanagh, with a number of spaces of engine and equipment thefts from vessels moored locally over recent years. Previously the local PSNI has issued warnings

and advice for boat owners, noting the county was a hive for water-based equipment.

"The equipment needed for these pursuits can be an easy target to criminals. There have been a number of thefts over the past number of years of boat engines, boats and trailers," a spokesman said previously.

"It's hard to imagine any property more vulnerable to theft and vandalism than a boat left on a mooring, likely unvisited for long periods of time. If you own a boat of whatever description it is a possible target for the criminal."

Boat owners are encouraged to improve their security around moorings and marinas, and to protect themselves as best as possible.

Planning underway for new Enniskillen Civil Service hub

PLANNING is underway for a new Civil Service hub in Enniskillen which is aimed at bringing jobs that would have previously been located in Belfast down here to Fermanagh, however it could be another two years before it opens.

Enniskillen has been chosen as one of 11 sites across the North as the location for one of the "Connect" regional hubs, which Finance Minister Conor Murphy said would transform the way the Civil Service operated by offering more flexibility and a better work-life balance.

It is also hoped the hub will create jobs locally once it is opened, with a sister hub due to be opened in Omagh at the end of April expected to create around 90 jobs.

While the Omagh hub is almost ready to go, the Enniskillen hub is still in the planning stages, and is expected to be open within the next two years.

Minister Murphy previously promised to investigate the delay in the progress with the Enniskillen hub, citing a lack of an available building as a possible reason.

Speaking in the Assembly in December, in response to a question

from the Member constituents who will not apply for a job in Belfast because of the travel involved.

"If they have the opportunity to be based in Enniskillen for two or three days a week, that may increase the interest in people from across County Fermanagh and other border areas applying for jobs within the Civil Service, which is all to the good. It changes the dynamic, and it introduces more rural and border dwellers, which is a good thing."

Minister Murphy said his department was working closely with the local Council, and said while he was keen to get the hub up and going, some other hubs elsewhere were "in a more ready state than others."

When asked to accelerate the creation of the Enniskillen hub by the local Council, Minister Murphy responded, "We will press ahead, as a matter of urgency, with all those hubs."

"The circumstances of particular councils, such as having readily available buildings in which to locate the hubs, means that they are more ready to engage. That might be an issue in Enniskillen, but we will get to the bottom of it and try to get working on it as quickly as we can."

Speeding woman detected at 112 mph is fined and banned

AN Enniskillen woman was detected traveling along the A5 between Ballypawley and Omagh at 112 miles per hour.

The speed limit for that stretch of road is 60mph however Diana Kalkukanova (50) of Moneyroy Park, Enniskillen was more than 50mph over the limit.

At Omagh Magistrates Court she was disqualified from driving for three months and fined £250. Kalkukanova was detected by camera on the evening of May 24 last year while driving a Mercedes. Due to the extent of the speed she could not be offered a fixed penalty.

Defence solicitor Peter Canavan told the court she

received a "distressing" call from her husband and was traveling to attend to him. He added she accepted it was an "inappropriate speed whatever the circumstances".

He also stated that she has children, is the sole earner in the home and her husband does not drive.

Imposing the disqualification and fine, District Judge Peter Prentiss said, "This was at 6.50pm in the evening in the middle of summer."

"It is a very very high speed. Luckily nothing happened save she was speeding. "It was an exceptionally high speed. I have no other choice than to disqualify."

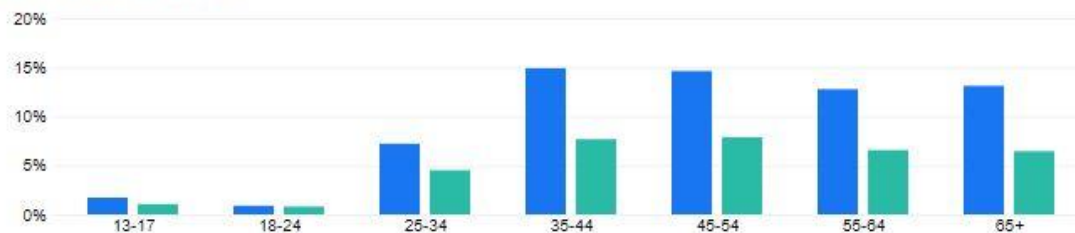
